

HERE IS OUR EXAMPLE:


Dear Duncan,

•Sign off your letter using 'from'

•Write in first person (I, me, my, we)

•Use emotive language (how is your crayon feeling?)

YOUR LETTER CHECKLIST:

Bronze

Capital letters, full stops, finger spaces, sentences make sense.

Silver

Use contracted words (such as I've instead of I have), conjunctions (and, but, so, because), use the features of a letter, include emotions to say how the crayon is feeling, use a word bank to spell words correctly

Gold

Use different sentence types (command, question, exclamation, statement), use commas to separate items in a list,

Challenge

Use alliterative adjectives (e.g. I'm the super, shiny silver crayon)
