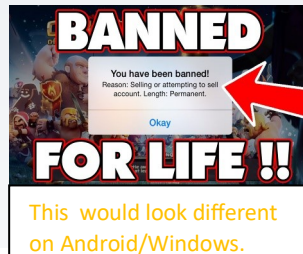
If someone has been saying mean things to you on Clash Royale, we can tell you how to block them or report them.

If yes, then it is probably inappropriate or mean as they might not take the joke.

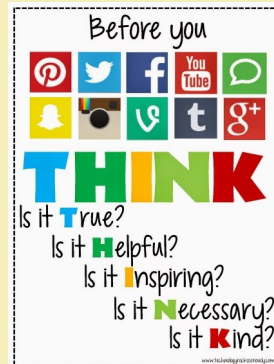
Here are some things to avoid in messages or comments:

APP SPOTLIGHT:

Musical.ly

What is it?

An app that allows you to share short videos set to music. It is rated 12+ but we know lots of people use it so we thought we should help you to make the right settings!

How to use musical.ly

Sign up or Sign in and the app will bring you to the home screen. Tap the yellow button in the bottom middle of the screen to start adding music. Choose the "pick music" option on the bottom left to select from Musical.ly's music library or your own music from your device.

Remember to check with your parents if accessing an app that is older than your real age!

How to be safe

It's easy for you to make your musical.ly account private so that others can't see your video clips unless they "follow" and, crucially, you "approve" them. Go to the "Profile" section by tapping the head on the bottom left of the screen and then select the "Settings gear" in the top right.

Remember, if you see anything inappropriate, report it.

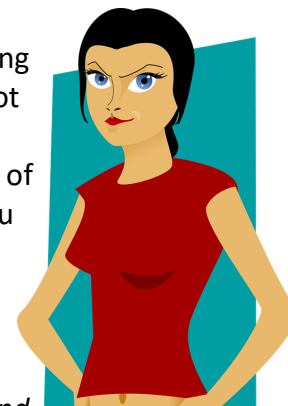
