

Miss Whitney's phonics 18/5/20

Well done on continuing to work so hard on your phonics! This week we are going to start looking at Phase 5. This is when we start to look at different spellings for the same sound. For example /oi/ like coin and /oy/ like toy.

We are starting with the graphemes /**ay**/ like **play** and /**oy**/ like **toy**.

Grapheme /ay/ makes the same sound as Phase 3 grapheme /ai/ like snail. It is used when the /ai/ sound comes at the end of a word (except where you would have 3 vowels together or in a compound word, e.g. we write 'crayon' instead of 'craion'). The same rule applies to /**oy**/.

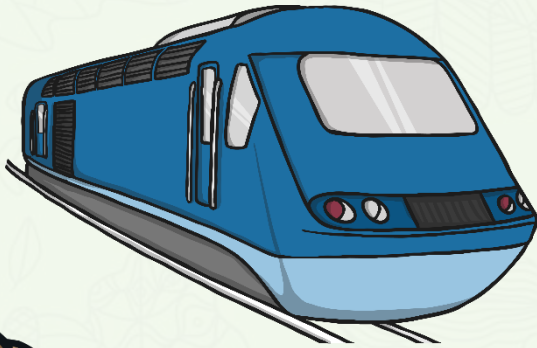

Spelling Words with 'ay' and 'oy'



What do we know about the phonemes /ay/ and /oy/ spelt with 'ai' and 'oi'? Click on the thought bubble to check.

The /ay/ and /oy/ sounds spelt with 'ai' and 'oi' are found at the beginning and middle of words but hardly ever at the end of English words.

This week we are looking at words with the **digraphs** 'ay' or 'oy' in them. Read these words out loud. Where are the 'ay' and 'oy' in each word?
