

Heymann Homeworking Menu - Year 1 - Week Beginning: 8th June 2020



In the table, there are lots of different homework activities to choose from. The blue boxes will be completed in school so if your child is returning please, do not do these activities before they have been in. Please, feel free to revisit them at home after their school input. The children in the Monday/Tuesday bubble will do the White Rose maths lessons 1 and 2 in school and those in the Thursday/Friday bubble will do lessons 3 and 4 in school.

At least one 4-star activity should be completed each week. You can choose to do whatever you like each week. However, you must try to earn 20 stars by the end of the week. When you have completed an activity and a parent has checked it, you can colour the number of stars you have achieved.

<p>English: Read a book for ten minutes, five days a week. (you will get one star for each day you complete the task)</p> <p>★</p>	<p>Music: In Kenyan music and culture are very important, listen to some African Music. See challenge sheet.</p> <p>★★★★</p>	<p>English: Choose one of the fruits or animals from the Handa Surprise story and make a stem poem. Watch the video demonstrating how to do this and see separate sheet. You may wish to use the vocab mat to support children with spellings.</p> <p>★★★</p>
<p>English: Talk for Writing Read the Handa Surprise story and using the Talk for Writing strategy, learn the story off by heart to help with writing next week. Try to use expression and intonation to make it sound more interesting. Play the matching game. Once child have matched the fruits to the animals can they think of adjectives to describe the fruits? If we get time and children know the story well we will begin to plan our writing.</p> <p>★★★★</p>	<p>Art: African sunset silhouettes. See examples on separate sheet.</p> <p>Or if you have access to a printer you may wish to colour in one of the Handa Surprise sheets or draw your own animal.</p> <p>★★</p>	<p>Maths: Complete your daily ten a day Maths. (you will get one star for each day you complete the task)</p> <p>★</p>	<p>Geography: Look at pictures of a village in African, like the one where Handa lives, and villages in England where we might live or stay on holiday...compare them.
