You usually use 'oy' at the end of a root word.

## toy destroy annoy

You usually use 'oi' at the beginning or in the middle of a root word.

## oil coin spoil noise

HOWEVER use 'oy' before a vowel... otherwise it will look strange!
royal not roial!
