1) Rule 7: Explanation

You usually use 'oy' at the end of a root word.

t<u>oy</u> destr<u>oy</u> ann<u>oy</u>

You usually use 'oi' at the beginning or in the middle of a root word.

<u>oi</u>l c<u>oi</u>n sp<u>oi</u>l n<u>oi</u>se

HOWEVER use 'oy' before a <u>vowel</u>... otherwise it will look strange!

royal not roial!

THINK: Why is 'oy' used in the middle of the words 'toyshop' and 'deployment'?

'oi' before

a vowel

Exception:

oyster

NOTE

The 'oy' sound is usually spelt 'oy' at the end of the root word. This may not be the end of the word as a whole if suffixes are used.

E.g. enjoyment, destroying.
