Today we are going to look at 2 types of clauses.

Main clause - has a subject and a predicate. Makes sense on its own. Subordinate clause - doesn't make sense with out a main clause



Subordinate Clauses



Subordinate clauses are used to add more information to sentences

Subordinate Clause Main Clause

Although I was scared, I crept inside.

The boy, who was ten, jumped.



The <u>main clause</u> still makes sense without the <u>subordinate clause</u>

The <u>subordinate clause</u> can go at the beginning or in the middle of the sentence I crept inside.

The boy who was ten, jumped.
