WHAT ARE THEY?

Adverbials are words or phrases that give more information to the sentence e.g. I discovered an interesting fossil earlier today.

The adverbial in that sentence is earlier today

That means a fronted adverbial is when we move the adverbial word or phrase to the front of the sentence.

Earlier today, I discovered an interesting fossil.
