













Who were the Heymann's?

Key People	
	Lewis Heymann One of the key people responsible for the development of lace in Nottingham. Became Mayor of Nottingham
	Albert Heymann Lewis' son who was a banker and a philanthropist. He also became Mayor of Nottingham like his father.
	John Musters Owned West Bridgford Hall whilst Lewis Heymann lived there. Albert Heymann bought the Hall from him later on.

Key Vocabulary	
industry 	the process of turning raw materials into finished products, or a particular business that does this.
lace 	A delicate fabric made either by machine or by hand
manufacture 	The making of goods on a large scale either by using machinery or by hand
mayor 	The chief official of a village, city or town
Philanthropist 	Someone who uses their wealth to donate to good causes

Important Places	
	West Bridgford Hall Lewis Heymann lived here and Albert Heymann later bought the hall to live there. Albert also bought the 19 acres that is now West Bridgford park
	Stoney Street The location of Lewis Heymann's lace factory 'Heymann and Alexander' between Plumpton Place and Barker Gate
	Albert Road Right next to West Bridgford Park that Albert Heymann used to own. Albert Road is named after him
	Park Lodge Built by the Heymann family as accommodation for people to stay in

The Lace Industry in Nottingham

Changes in fashion meant that women wanted to wear more delicate material. With small changes, the knitting frame could create lace.

Lots of lace warehouses were created in a part of Nottingham which is now called 'The Lace Market'.

Albert Heymann was most well known for making lace curtains and he was the first person who had been able to do this.

What did it impact?

Population – More people moved into the area as the lace industry in Nottingham employed around 25,000 women.

Economy – Nottingham's Lace Market became the centre of the global lace industry. It brought a lot of wealth to Nottinghamshire businesses. Even the King and Queen visited the Nottingham lace factories!
